## **1. Introduction to SB COP** Chair 10'

## COP30 is the 30th United Nations Climate Change Conference, scheduled to take place in Belém, Brazil

#### **Conference of the Parties (COP)**



**COP began in 1995**, **uniting 197 nations** annually under the UNFCCC to address climate action, now marking its **30th edition** 



Key milestones include **1997 Kyoto Protocol** (COP3) to cut emissions and **2015 Paris Agreement (COP21)** to limit warming to 1.5°C with mandatory emissions tracking



Over 30 years, COP has expanded to tackle **biodiversity, climate finance, loss and damage, and global stocktakes** 

#### **Decision-Making and Voting Process**

- Decisions at COP are made by consensus, meaning all member states must agree unanimously for any resolution or agreement
- Each member state has equal voting power, regardless of its size, economic status, or political influence

#### Private Sector Role

COP is government-driven, focused on international agreements
